

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

CINCINNATI AREA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE 1: NAME

The name of this Association shall be the Cincinnati Area Baptist Association.

ARTICLE 2: PURPOSE AND MISSION

This association is the successor by merger of 2 Associations known as the Southern Hills Baptist Association and the Baptist Association of Greater Cincinnati. The Purpose and Mission of this Association is to enhance the greater ministry impact and effectiveness of the member churches as they seek to advance and fulfill the Great Commission, in voluntary cooperation with the State Convention of Baptists in Ohio and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE 3: MEMBERSHIP

This Association shall consist of those churches that voluntarily unite with the Association and who are in accord with the Baptist Faith and Message. Each Member church in good standing shall be entitled to send 3 messengers to the Association's Annual and Semi-Annual Meetings. Such messengers shall be entitled to vote upon all matters of Association business to be considered at these Meetings.

ARTICLE 4: OFFICERS

The officers of this Association shall be: Moderator; Vice-Moderator; Treasurer; Clerk; 5 Trustees and Trustee. All Officers shall take office upon the close of the Annual Meeting at which they are elected and shall hold office until their successors are elected. Except for Clerk and Treasurer, no officer shall hold office for more than 2 successive terms. Trustees shall hold office for 3 year terms, such terms to be staggered among the Trustees. All other officers shall hold office for one-year terms.

ARTICLE 5: ADMINISTRATION

The Association may create offices, committees, and agencies for the administration of the Association, as may be deemed useful and necessary to accomplish the mission of the Association.

ARTICLE 6: AMENDMENTS

The Constitution may be amended by an affirmative vote of three-fourths of the messengers present and voting at the Association's Annual Meeting. The proposed amendment must be submitted to the Association at the prior Annual Meeting.

BY-LAWS

OF THE CINCINNATI AREA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I: AUTHORITY

Section A. <u>Authority</u>: The Association shall be wholly advisory, and shall never assume an ecclesiastical authority over the churches. The Association shall not send any council, committee, or other group into any church, except upon direct written request of that church.

ARTICLE II: MEMBERSHIP

- Section A. Messengers: Each member church in good standing shall be authorized to elect 3 messengers. Each church plant is encouraged to constitute and apply for membership in the Association as early as possible.
- Section B. Affiliation: Any church desiring to be received into the fellowship of the Association shall forward a written request (letter or email) to the Association office at least 90 days prior to either the Annual or the Semi-Annual Meeting. This request should include the church's statement of faith, constitution, and declaration of their purpose to cooperate with the Association. The Administrative Leadership Team (ALT) will be responsible to examine the credentials of the petitioning church. Recommendations from the ALT shall be made to the Association at either the Annual or Semi-Annual Meetings. Upon the approval of a three-fourths (75%) majority vote of the messengers present to receive the church, the moderator shall declare the church received and its messengers seated.

A church may choose to withdraw from the fellowship of the Association with written notification.

- Section C. <u>Discipline:</u> The Association reserves the right to withdraw fellowship by a three-fourths (75%) majority vote at an Annual or Semi-Annual Meeting from any church it deems:
 - 1. To have departed from the teaching of the New Testament (as summarized in the Baptist Faith and Message) in doctrine or conduct as previously stated in the article on membership of the constitution this Association; or
 - 2. To have failed to correspond with the Association for two (2) consecutive years. Upon invitation from the church, this church shall first be visited by a group assigned by the Administrative Leadership Team to determine the cause and seek resolution; or
 - 3. To have refused to support financially the program of the Association.

ARTICLE III: ADMINISTRATION

- Section A. Administrative Leadership Team (ALT): The ALT shall be responsible for the administrative functions of the Association, including but not limited to finance/budgeting, personnel, nominating, credentialing of churches, and programming for the Annual and Semi-Annual Meetings.
 - 1. <u>Membership</u>: The ALT shall consist of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Treasurer, Clerk, the Trustee Chairman and four (4) At Large members elected at the Annual Meeting. The four At Large members shall serve a two-year term and be staggered to prevent the entire team from changing over at the same time. It may also include additional non-voting members, as appropriate to the task.
 - 2. <u>Nominations for ALT</u>: The ALT is responsible for presenting nominations for the ALT at the Annual Meeting. However, any church may propose additional nominations. If there are more nominations than positions to be filled, then a ballot vote shall be taken.
 - 3. <u>Responsibilities</u>: The ALT shall act for and on behalf of the Association between the Annual and Semi-Annual Meetings, but shall refrain from making major decisions that can be deferred until one of those meetings. The ALT may recommend that the moderator call a Special Session of the Association, if needed.
- Section B. Staff: The Association may employ such staff, as it deems necessary. The ALT shall be responsible for employing or making recommendations of persons, compensation packages, and job descriptions for all employees, with the exception of the Director of Missional Leadership.
 - 1. <u>Selection of the Director of Missional Leadership</u>: The Association will appoint a special search committee, which will be responsible for recommending a candidate for approval. The Association must approve the recommended candidate by a three-fourths (75%) majority vote.
 - 2. <u>Selection of Other Career Missionaries</u>: The ALT will be responsible for recommending a candidate for approval by the Association in session. The Association must approve the recommended candidate by a three-fourths (75%) majority vote.
 - 3. <u>Termination of Missionaries</u>: The ALT will be responsible for recommending the termination of the Director of Missional Leadership and other career missionaries to the Association. The Association must approve such recommendations to terminate with a majority (>50%) vote.

Section C. Financial Contributions:

The Association, in exercise of its religious purposes and strategies, will establish designated accounts to be controlled by the Administrative Leadership Team (ALT). The ALT may consider recommendations from anyone, but in no event is the committee bound in any way to honor the recommendations. Donors will not be permitted to recover a contribution on the grounds that the ALT failed to honor the donor's recommendation.

If the Association votes at any time in the future to close a particular designated account, all the money in that fund will go to the general budget of the Association. If funds are not used within a year of the last donations for the purpose intended, the ALT has the authority to make decisions on the future of the account.

ARTICLE IV: MEETINGS

- Section A. <u>Meetings:</u> This Association shall meet two (2) times per year at the Annual and Semi-Annual Meetings.
- Section B. Special Session: The moderator, upon the advice and consent of the Administrative Leadership Team, may call a special session. Notification must be made in writing to the churches at least two (2) weeks prior to the session. It must include the reason for the meeting and the matter(s) to be considered.
- Section C. <u>Parliamentary Procedure:</u> The latest edition of Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the procedure of all sessions.

Administrative Leadership Team Report Recommendations from ALT

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS AMENDMENT ON TRUSTEES:

At the last Annual Meeting, CABA approved an amended recommendation to reduce the number of elected Trustees to two -- one who will serve on the ALT and an alternate, who will serve as needed. This amendment needs to be voted upon at this Annual Meeting. Our Constitution requires an affirmative vote of 75% of the messengers present and voting. The amended language for the Constitution and By-Laws is listed below in italics:

CONSTITUTION -- ARTICLE 4: OFFICERS

The officers of this Association shall be: Moderator; Vice-Moderator; Treasurer; Clerk; and Trustee. All Officers shall take office upon the close of the Annual Meeting at which they are elected and shall hold office until their successors are elected. Except for Clerk and Treasurer, no officer shall hold office for more than 2 successive terms. All officers shall hold office for one-year terms.

BY-LAWS – ARTICLE III: ADMINISTRATION

- Section A. Administrative Leadership Team (ALT): The ALT shall be responsible for the administrative functions of the Association, including but not limited to finance/budgeting, personnel, nominating, credentialing of churches, and programming for the Annual and Semi-Annual Meetings.
 - 1. <u>Membership</u>: The ALT shall consist of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Treasurer, Clerk, the **Trustee**, and four (4) At Large members elected at the Annual Meeting. The four At Large members shall serve a two-year term and be staggered to prevent the entire team from changing over at the same time. **In addition, an Alternate Trustee will be elected to serve, as needed.** It may also include additional nonvoting members, as appropriate to the task.

Credentialing Committee Report

Committee Members: Glenn LaRue, Allen Suit, Greg Birdwell, Tom Leach, Mark Snowden

Since CABA's last association meeting on October 3, 2022, the Administrative Leadership Team (ALT) appointed a sub-group to serve as a credentialing committee to consider some important questions with regard to church membership in our association. This committee met on January 4 and February 6, 2023, and has agreed upon several points of clarity to recommend to the association.

We felt the need to have these meetings for the following reasons:

- 1. To provide clarity about our doctrinal standard. Some sister Baptist associations include churches with various levels of agreement with the Baptist Faith and Message 2000 (BFM).
- 2. To provide clarity concerning involvement criteria. Some CABA churches have not been involved through giving financially or submitting an Annual Church Profile (ACP) for a number of years.
- 3. To provide clarity about an SBC affiliation requirement. Some sister Baptist associations have member churches that are not SBC affiliated.
- 4. To provide clarity about sexual misconduct reporting expectations.
- 5. To provide clarity about the status of church plants, re-plants, multi-site churches, college campus church, and military gatherings.
- 6. To provide clarity for how credentialing criteria are to be investigated and enforced.
- 7. To provide a credentialing review questionnaire as a tool for understanding where any given church stands.

Our recommendations are as follows:

1. A CABA church should be in full agreement with the Baptist Faith and Message 2000.

Rationale: The BFM is intended to cover both primary doctrines of orthodoxy and secondary doctrines of cooperation. Should any church not agree with the BFM on any point, their disagreement will be on one of these two levels, both of which are barriers for ministry unity. If we were to make exceptions, it is hard to imagine what the justification would be for them and where the concessions would end.

2. A CABA church should participate both through annual financial support and annual ACP submission.

Rationale: We believe that these two criteria represent a bare minimum of church involvement because they are essential for CABA's functionality. If we do not require these two basic things, the legitimacy of being associated together is brought into question.

3. A CABA church should be an SBC church with an SBC ID#.

Rationale: We are an association of Southern Baptist churches. We believe that CABA should be a local expression of the same doctrine and principles that bind SBC churches on a larger scale. It is relatively simple for a church to be an SBC church, so this is not an unreasonable burden for CABA to expect of its churches.

4. A CABA church should be expected to report criminal convictions and/or personal confessions of sexual abuse or misconduct by church staff or members to the association.

Rationale: As a matter of protecting our churches from known sexual offenders, CABA should be informed of any incidents that occur in one of its churches, so that a record for inquiry is available to other churches.

5. A CABA church should be any participating gathering that has its own SBC ID# and is constituted and will carry the full benefits and expectations of CABA involvement.

Rationale: The simplest way for our association to distinguish a new individual local church from a ministry that is still underneath the umbrella of an established local church is by virtue of an SBC ID#. Once a ministry has reached the point of SBC recognition, its national status should correspond with its local status.

- 6. CABA should investigate a church's membership for any of the following reasons:
 - A. If questions were raised about a church's fidelity to the BFM.
 - B. If a church has not given financially to CABA for two years in a row.
 - C. If a church has not submitted an ACP for two years in a row.
 - D. If questions were raised about a church's reporting of sexual misconduct.

The first step of investigation should be a phone call and/or meeting to alert the church to the concern and seek understanding of the matter. Should it be found that a church is not compliant with CABA requirements, the church should receive a formal letter notifying them that they are not in good standing and inviting them to renew participation under full doctrinal agreement.

Rationale: Churches should be given the opportunity to correct mistakes regarding cooperation. The goal is not separation but cooperation. Communication with a church in question gives the opportunity to set things in order. If a church is eager to be in good standing, we should be happy to allow that church to change course and continue in CABA. If not, then this process gives appropriate notice of removal.

7. CABA should require churches applying for membership to complete a "Credentialing Checklist" (see below) and should require all of its member churches to complete a "Credentialing Check-Up" every five years (see below). It should include the following questions:

Rationale: Any new churches applying for membership in CABA should be carefully considered. The "Credentialing Checklist" provides a basis for examination. Also, it should not be assumed that just because a church was appropriately credentialed when they joined CABA that a church will always stay that way. Therefore, the "Credentialing Check-Up" provides a basis for periodic review to protect the integrity of our cooperation. The initiation of these reviews could be staggered over the first five years so that one-fifth of our churches will participate in a review every year.

College Ministry Report

Committee Members: Greg Burch, chmn., Doug Saunders, and Mark Snowden

CABA's ALT appointed this sub-committee to study college ministry and the use of the house on Clifton Avenue across from the University of Cincinnati's campus on fraternity/sorority row. This committee met January 12, February 7 and 28. This report was then presented to the Semi-Annual Meeting on March 27th to shape the future of college ministry in CABA. The ALT approved the final report June 27, 2023.

Situational Analysis:

- 1. College ministry at the University of Cincinnati was started in 1958. The property known as The House at 2699 Clifton Ave., across from UC's administrative building was purchased by the association in 2000. The building is 100 years old being constructed in 1922 or 1923.
- 2. In the Cincinnati Area, there are 22 colleges; 15 private colleges and universities; five public colleges and universities, and two community colleges (2 yr. degrees).
- 3. In the past ten years, three churches have grown up to work among college students: Christ the King Uptown, H2O Church on campus, and Mercy Hill (Salt Co.) just off-campus.
- 4. Dr. Ken Dillard retired after 32 years of directing college ministry, being the last few years as the leader of the Collegiate Ministry Group, which was self-funded with its own board. The CMG was founded in 2017 and closed June 2023.
- 5. CABA's financial investment in The House amounted to \$6,900/yr. (\$3,400 property tax, \$1,500 blanket insurance, and \$2,000 maintenance). Ongoing upgrades (windows, refrigerator, paving, showers, etc.) are separate.
- 6. CABA sought to lease the building. CABA handles the light fixtures, not the bulbs. There is a concern to be a good steward of student rentals to use in ministry.

Study Group Recommendations:

- 1. Do not sell property on Clifton Avenue.
- 2. Seek to make CABA's college ministry financially self-supporting.
- 3. Since CMG no longer exists, CABA sought H2O Church to provide low-cost rent for using the property and provide all maintenance. A two-year Lease Agreement has been signed indicating that CABA is to receive 10% of H2O's receipts from renters.
- 4. An aligned CABA church such as H2O, would place renters and apply it to pay utilities and some maintenance. H2O Church is permitted to have contracts signed with student renters.
- 5. H2O Church would continue an on-campus ministry using the property for offices, leader training, small group Bible study, a place to park their ministry van, and special events.

A word about strategic alignment: CABA's approach "seeks to resource a dynamic leadership network that impacts lostness" and appreciates this ongoing alignment.

MINUTES OF 11th SEMI-ANNUAL MEETING- MARCH 27, 2023

The Cincinnati Area Baptist Association met for their 11th Semi-Annual Meeting on Monday, March 27, 2023 at Mt. Carmel Baptist Church, 8645 Kenwood Rd., Cincinnati, OH 45242.

The messengers were led in praise and worship by the Covering Praise Band. Cliff Myers, Transitional Pastor of Mt. Carmel, welcomed everyone and led in an opening prayer. Doug Saunders, Vice-Moderator of CABA, then called the meeting to order.

Allen Suit, CABA Clerk, seated the messengers. We had 30 messengers from 17 churches, and 15 guests from 9 churches.

Allen Suit, chairman of the ALT, recommended that Jake Day, pastor of Freedom Baptist Church, replace Mark Baugh as the Chairman of the Trustees. Mark had to resign due to health reasons. Pastor Day was elected without opposition.

Allen Suit acknowledged the upcoming retirement of Ken Dillard from the Collegiate Ministry Group. Ken received a standing ovation of appreciation.

Allen Suit also pointed out three reports that will be discussed and voted upon in the next Annual Meeting: (1) Constitution and By-Laws Amendment on Trustees - p. 11, (2) Credentialing Committee Report - p. 12, and (3) College Ministry Report - p. 16. He asked that people review each report at their convenience and forward any questions or recommended changes to the ALT prior to the Annual Meeting.

Mark Snowden introduced the keynote speaker for the evening -- Brad Cunningham, pastor of Liberty Heights Church. His focus was "Making Disciples on Purpose," indicating that the church should be the most strategic organization on the planet. He addressed nine major points in a two-part presentation.

- 1. Start with your mission statement.
- 2. Build a process to move people through the key steps in your mission statement.
- 3. Design a strategy to flesh out your mission statement.
- 4. Flesh out your strategy in 12-month blocks.
- 5. Create a scorecard and celebrate wins.
- 6. Assimilate people on purpose.
- 7. Create a culture of generosity to resource clarified strategy.
- 8. Preach to effectively equip.

Make sure you do not create a para-church within the local church with your student ministries.

In between the two presentations, the Covering Praise Band sang a song, and Mark Snowden presented this year's Pacesetters Awards – p. 28.

Doug Saunders closed the meeting.

The meeting was followed by a dessert fellowship.

- 3. Mt. Carmel Baptist Church- Is a partnering church. Will assist them in setting up their ESL program and Mid-Autumn Festival. They will host my Talking Around the Table discussion group.
- 4. Peoples Church- Consulting with Pastor Chris Beard regarding planting a multi-ethnic church.
- 5. Meeting the requirements and filling out the application to NAMB as a church planter.
- 6. Planning and setting up an International Fellowship at Glory Baptist to grow into the International Fellowship Church.

CABA Church Collaboration

- 1. South Asia Mission Trip- Had several preparatory meetings in preparation for the trip. Went on mission trip and trained 23 national pastors and leaders.

Through this ministry, more than \$11 million is distributed annually to help retirement-age Southern Baptist ministers, workers and their widows whose income is insufficient to meet their needs. These men and women have faithfully served God's people and now find themselves struggling to meet even basic needs. Many served small, rural churches that paid only modest salaries and couldn't afford to contribute to their pastor's retirement.

More than 2,800 individuals receive assistance each year, and nineteen of them live in our state. Approximately 60% of the recipients are widows. One out of four recipients is a pastor's widow age 85 or older.

All of the funding for the Mission:Dignity ministry comes from the direct gifts of individuals, groups and churches like you in our Southern Baptist family. Through these gifts, recipients no longer have to choose between food, paying their bills, or affording prescriptions. Instead, they can buy groceries, pay a utility bill, or get prescriptions and medical care because of the generosity of their brothers and sisters in Christ.

It's more than just the money. We are called to honor and serve those who served us.

Director's Report-Mark Snowden

The Lord has moved strongly among our churches in the past six months! Here are just a few highlights to celebrate:

- 1. Mission Journey: Kids 14 churches chose to take us up on the offer to buy a year's worth of free curriculum for their church. Missions education for children grades 1-6 was already in one church and it's now in 13 more!
- 2. The Baptist Paper was offered free for a year to CABA churches. There were 38 subscriptions activated for a year providing access to SBC issues, kingdom growth models, and missions education.
- 3. Our Annual Missions Emphasis has been focused on supporting church planters. There are 19 church planters that are active in the Cincinnati Area. They are supported by one or more CABA churches!
- 4. After Urbancrest Baptist encouraged me to develop a class on evangelizing cross-culturally and the IMB expressing interest, I was given approval to have a focused working sabbatical to develop a 7-video course on 7 missionary jobs. A leader guide is free that accompanies the videos located on my YouTube channel.
- 5. A mission team that I helped to train left without me two days after I had surgery for shattering my tibia. One highlight included training for 15 pastors and five evangelists in Four Fields, a methodology close to No Place Left.
- 6. In the Spring an Evangelism Cohort was formed, loosely around five churches that had requested training. Three churches conducted No Place Left and two churches and I recorded training videos added to CABA's YouTube Channel.
 - a. Lamar Ferrell, Beracah Ch, Middletown: Evangelizing Your Community's Power Centers
 - b. Tom Pendergrass, Urbancrest Baptist, Lebanon: Organizing Your Church for Evangelism
 - c. Mark Snowden: Evangelizing People Who are Not Like You
- 7. John Park, CABA's Communications Director, finished the new CABA website which allowed for tools such as the director's new podcasts.
- 8. A Lease Agreement was established for H2O Church to manage CABA's property on Clifton Avenue. The Anchor is the new name of what used to be The House.
- 9. Two study groups completed their work on college ministry and credentialing.
- 10. Trustees were active, spreading gravel at the CABA parking lot and making several repairs at the Clifton property such as leaking pipes, handicap ramp, and painting the back porch. Three new AC window units were placed upstairs.
- 11. A donation of \$10,000 was granted to CABA for renewing the Pastors Relief Assistance program, providing \$750 to pastors providing receipts for expenses.
- 12. Several church staff utilized CABA services such as new church logos and biblical counseling.



State Convention of Baptists in Ohio— Reagan Wagoner

It has been a great year in the state of Ohio as we continue to see new churches planted, people coming to know Jesus, and more churches focus on missional unity as we partner together to advance God's kingdom. And the best part? We are seeing lots of next steps for God taken by the next generation in our state!

As we began the year, the SCBO brought on Keith Hurt to serve specifically as our Next Gen Catalyst, and together we are reaching the next generation through some of our next gen leadership and student events already this year. The VBS Training Clinics across Ohio saw 288 VBS directors and leaders in attendance. Throughout the spring, many VBS Clinics and Next Gen Conferences were well attended across our state. At Super Summer, we had a record attendance of 450 students & counselors, with 27 decisions for Christ, 30 decisions for baptisms, 37 called into full-time ministry, and 76 called into missions. At Camp U Can this summer, 85 students came to camp, and 45 prayed to receive Christ as their Savior! We believe that

it is this focus on partnering with churches to help reach the next generation that has led to an increase of 32% in baptisms from 2021 to 2022 (2,296 baptisms in 2022!), and we are praying for even more growth as our churches share the Gospel by the end of this year.

The SCBO added Josh Remy as our new Southeast Regional Catalyst this year. This position was previously held by Art Fulks, who moved to Georgia to become an Associational Mission Strategist outside of Atlanta. Josh will remain as the full-time Lead Pastor of First Baptist Church, Waverly as he serves the Southeast region. We were also privileged to add Mark Jones to our team as the Revitalization Catalyst, who is already connecting with pastors across our state! One such pastor is Todd Cyphers, who replanted after First Baptist Waynesville was about to close its doors. The church was down to around 40 people, but now has seen attendance jump back up to around 200 after relaunching as Waynesville Community Church. With as many as 70% of our churches in decline and according to Barna, 12+ Protestant churches closing their doors every day, we are thankful for Mark's willingness to help take on the task of revitalizing churches across our state!

In addition, the SCBO also partnered in 2023 with the Center for Christian Virtue, which is helping to stand for life for the unborn child and also to support women. We are praying for and rallying churches to the cause of supporting pro-life causes, especially this November. Steve Hopkins has also been rallying pastors and churches to pray all over the state, and is gearing up for more prayer focused events featuring guest speaker, Bill Elliff, in every region. Nearly 100 pastors and leaders from all over the state headed to Violet Baptist Church to pray with Daniel Henderson earlier this year, and there is also a prayer gathering planned in September down in Tennessee in a multi-state partnership including the Tennessee Baptist Convention.

John Heading and our Ohio Disaster Relief Team served this year already from East Palestine to Budapest, and is currently planning to send a team to help with the recovery in Guam from a recent typhoon there.

The SCBO also is continuing to bring leaders together in old and new ways to strengthen pastors and their leaders through events such as the Lead Well Conference, Southwest Ohio Leaders Conference, Amplify, and Loving and Leading the Local Church! We are also happy to report that as of July 2023, we are \$148,000 ahead in giving year over year to the Cooperative Program. This means more money for our church planters, missionaries, and seminaries with 50% of our giving furthering the Gospel and the kingdom beyond Ohio!
