

Peace from Christ was Her 'Sign to Believe'

"It just kind of clicked one day," Mandi Santos says. "I didn't feel like I was missing anything anymore, and I was like, 'Ahhh.'"

Peace had "clicked."



It was flowing from "knowing Christ, because he brings such a peace," Santos said.

Peace with God was helping her overcome struggles with anger, bouts

with migraine headaches and moments of depression.

In her journal on April 3 of last year (2022), the 25-year-old kindergarten teacher wrote in part:

"Dear God, you are good and worthy. I believe in you and the good that you've put in my life. God, I ask that you guide all the good I know you are and be the light that's been missing. I put my faith and trust in you to show me the best path for me."

For times of doubt, Santos prayed that "you shed light on the good that you are and how far I have come."

Peace, she said in an interview, had become "a sign to believe," marking a spiritual journey that began strangely in 2019 at a small group she was attending at the behest of a boyfriend who was a Christian.

Leading Church Change

To every leader who wants to help their church change.

Step 1: Test the Waters.

Most ideas fail on arrival because they haven't been thought through. They are good ideas, not great, because people don't understand the reason why. Fix this is by testing the waters with others in 1 on 1 casual conversations. Get feedback but do NOT ask for opinions in a group; once someone gives their opinion in public, they won't change it. When you get "negative" feedback listen to those resisters; they tell you how others might re-

spond. Understand their concerns, and make changes in light of their feedback. Resisters are not the enemy. They help fill in your blind spots and turn good ideas into great ones.

Our Baptist association has never been more in demand!

The Cincinnati Area Baptist Association was formed in 2013 out of two associations. The concept of Baptist associations in what became the SBC in 1845 was started in Charleston, So. Car., in 1751.

George Bullard retired last year as the associational director for Columbia, So. Car. He writes a column for *The Baptist Paper*. He says our Baptist life is left with empty spots when the denomination, states, and associations do not carry out their distinctive roles.

CABA networks solutions between churches extremely well. The association's leaders don't have all the answers, but the Lord has answers in our churches. Bringing people together to develop a dynamic leadership network is CABA's priority. With more than 110 churches, this creates a great opportunity for learning and growing, as well as helping and healing.

We're family! Bullard said that each of the three dimensions of SBC denominational life have a distinctive kinship relationship with congregations. "If associations are Family to congregations," he said, "state conventions are a Friend, and SBC entities are an Acquaintance."

Rick Curtis, a NAMB consultant that works with associational leaders was quoted at this year's NAMB RePlant Lab. He said, "The Associational Mission Strategist is the single most important denominational position in the SBC."

Why Have an Association?

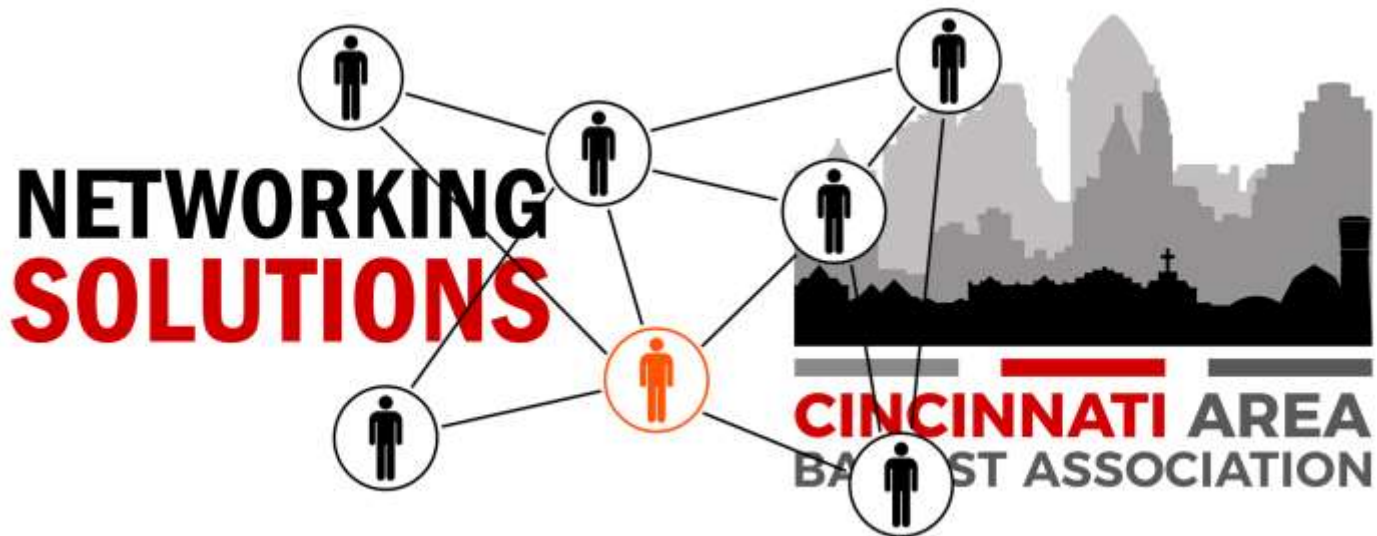

Although an association is not a missionary-sending entity, it is a unique missional organization. We must "avoid SBC conformity," Bullard said. "When associations conform to their state convention and the national agencies and institutions, they lack clear vision." In other words, we are grassroots and connect on a more intimate level. I think this is why the SBC is increasingly appreciating its associations.

Since the association IS the churches, then the churches must fund the work of CABA-and do. CABA only receives funds from affiliated churches. However, since its inception, church contributions have continued to decline little-by-little. As Bullard says, "We are a member-based type of organization regarding finances." Increasing by one percent brings huge changes. That's a great giving opportunity here, too!

The best part of our Cincinnati Area Baptist Association is that it is local. This is changing in some associations. "Contextual strategies" as Bullard described it, make the association the only one of the three entities that can effectively work at the local level.

Ray is called to be the Senior Pastor at Power Mission Baptist Church in Cincinnati, OH in October 2022. Prior to this, he served as the lead pastor of Journey of Faith church in Dallas for 18 years. Power Mission Baptist Church has now become a church with many families with children and has two congregations: a Korean-speaking congregation and an



English-speaking congregation. PMBC members are still predominantly Koreans. However, as the number of next generation Korean Americans grew, the church has embraced the vision of becoming a church for all nations.

Step 2: Count the Cost

Every change will cost you something. You need to know the price tag beforehand. It might cost relational or leadership capital or even church members. But you must ask, what does a failure to act cost us? The failure to change could cost more.

Step 3: Define the Win

Everyone loves winning. Winning teams don't have problems selling tickets. At sporting events we know who the winner is because there is a giant scoreboard. But what does it mean to win in the church? Everyone defines that differently. You must show your church what it looks like to win, or they will define it for themselves. Then you can show them how this new direction, helps your church win!

Step 4: Lead

Finally you have to lead! There will still be "squeaky wheels"-those people who will always complain, but do not let them change your course, just let them squeak.

During a time when the group was praying over each other, “I shut my eyes and I saw this really vivid image of Jesus reaching out his hand to me,” Santos recounted.

“I was freaked out ... and opened my eyes really quickly. I was like, ‘Oh my goodness, what just happened?’”

Yet it had no immediate impact on her life. An angry streak persisted. “This doesn’t sound great, but I was quick to judge. If you did something to me, I would do it right back to you, just to try to make it worse,” Santos said. In coping with depression, “I would try to fill my unhappiness with material things, so I would shop all the time.” An abusive ex-boyfriend was part of the reason she met with a counselor for a number of months.

A sense of guilt over “generally bad life decisions” heightened. “I started saying in my head, ‘Forgive me, Father, for I have sinned.’ It popped up at the most random moments,” even if she hadn’t sinned at the time.

In July 2021, Santos made a new friend named Rayna on the social connections Bumble BFF app. “We kind of told each other our stories,” Santos said, “and we had a lot in common.” After meeting in person at a Cincinnati Reds baseball game and at a movie, their friendship took off.

Rayna’s influence helped “bring me to Christ,” Santos said. Early on, when Rayna spoke of her faith and invited her to church, Santos was reticent to say very much because “I had too many questions. And I was like, if I asked this or that question, she might stop being friends with me or judge me.”

Among the questions: How do you have a relationship with God? How do you talk to him? How do you know what he’s trying to tell you or what his plan is? How do you believe in something that you can’t see?

Yet Santos took note of how Rayna “lights up when she talks about the Lord and what he’s done for her. There’s this peace with her.” She could be going through anxious times at work, in her studies and in relationships “and she’s still peaceful about it. She’s not like panicking or anxious or angry. She’s like, ‘Okay, God’s got me.’”

Santos’ first grasp of peace came during a trip to Chicago with some friends last March (2022) when she was battling a headache and went back to the

hotel. Compared to her angst over migraines dating back to college, she was “very still, very peaceful — and I think that was when my heart turned and said, Okay, let’s dive deep.”

Back in Cincinnati, Santos started praying, reading the Bible and unpacking her questions to Rayna. “She didn’t judge me for all of my doubtful questions and the dumb questions I had about the Bible because, obviously, I hadn’t read it a lot.” Accepting Rayna’s invitation to Bridge City Church, a new congregation led by Jonathan Howard that began meeting in January, Santos felt “it was great. Everyone was so welcoming. I just clicked immediately with the people there.”

Penning her journal entry last April, Santos had embraced “full-force believing,” as she put it.

She has downloaded a daily Bible verse app and been involved in several Bible studies, including one with Howard’s wife, also named Mandie, using Lysa Terkeurst’s “Uninvited: Living Love When You Feel Less Than, Left Out and Lonely.” Santos also listens to sermons and teaching on the internet — and keeps notes — and is venturing into Christian books, such as J.D. Greear’s “Gospel: Recovering the Power that Made Christianity Revolutionary” and Francine Rivers’ novel, “Redeeming Love.” And she was baptized on April 2 of this year (2023).

Musically, her “phases” of country, Disney from her childhood and the 2000s have been replaced by “upbeat” contemporary Christian music. “It just makes me happy, like I can jam to it, I wake up with it, and if I’m driving anywhere, I’ll listen to it,” she said. “It gives me, like, a peace. If someone has really bad road rage, if I’m listening to Christian music, it doesn’t bother me.”

In new birth, her instances of anger and “freak-outs” occur “a lot less frequently, and when I do get overwhelmed, I just handle it a lot better.” She noted that “all of the other reasons I used to get migraines have disappeared and now it’s just weather-based, like when the pressure changes and it might rain.”

“I’m a lot less selfish than I was,” Santos said. “Inside looking out, I would like to believe that I am like a light for people when they’re having a bad day, with even strangers.”

Why the ACP (Annual Church Profile) is important THIS year

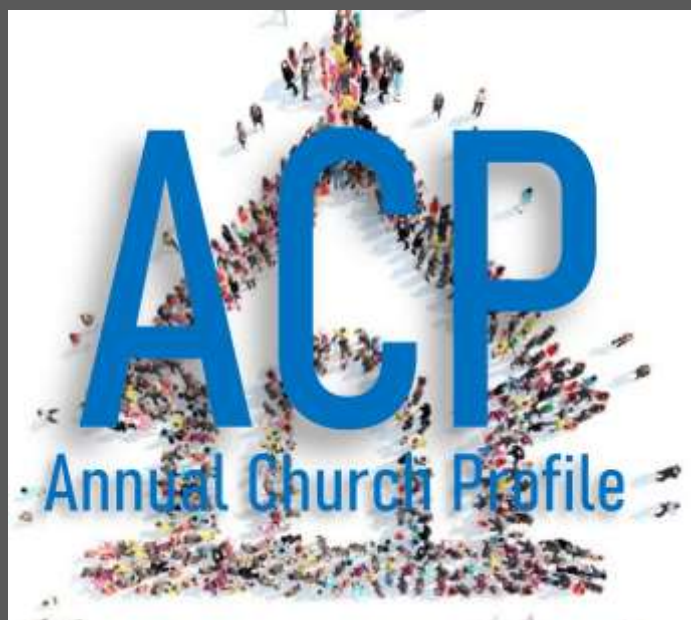
Baptist Associations collect data for the Southern Baptist Convention. Statistics are reported for July 1 of the previous year to June 30 of the current year. Last year, the SCBO awarded \$1,000 to the association in which all churches finished their ACP report first. It wasn't CABA (sigh).

This year's ACP will help CABA, the SBCO, and SBC to network solutions. It can help your church's leaders to identify drift or trajectory. Most important, it shows how God is at work in our midst.

The ACP is important because it provides your church with a snapshot of its past. In CABA, some more than 70 churches have a 10-year reporting record. It is the first thing a new pastor wants to review. The ACP records baptisms, AM Worship attendance, giving, and other aspects of SBC life. It has also "shrunk" to the basics captured in one page rather than nine pages in years past.

Again, these stats aren't just for CABA, but the SBC. It's another service that associations provide.

So, when you receive notice of your ACP in mid-August this year, take time to enter the stats online at sbcworkspace.com or simply email the info to CABAoffice@gmail.com. We'll do it for you. It's that important.

I am absolutely delighted to serve as CABA's International Partnerships Consultant because I get to share with you the vision of CABA for international ministries locally and globally. There are over 100,000 first generation immigrants representing more than 45 people groups currently living in the Cincinnati area. When you include their children, who are growing up or were born in the USA, we are approaching closer to 200,000 immigrants present in your neighborhoods. The ethnic groups represented are from all over the world with the greatest numbers from Asia.

The largest Asian people groups are Hindi speaking Indians, Nepali speaking Bhutanese, Chinese Mandarin, Vietnamese, Taiwanese Hokkien, Korean, Filipino, Tagalog, Khmer speaking Cambodians, Gujarati, Urdu, Thai, and Japanese. The next largest people group categories in descending order are Latino-Hispanic, Middle East-Central Asia, and similar numbers for Africans and Europeans. These are 2016 stats and the number of first and second generation immigrants living here most likely have increased.

The world has come to Cincinnati! Importantly from a Mat. 28:19 and Acts 1:8 standpoint these internationals remain connected to their friends and family across the oceans. Now we have unprecedented opportunities to build relationships and impact internationals for Christ in our own backyard. In doing so, we also can reach the world through them because of the connectivity between local and overseas internationals. We at CABA want to assist you in your international ministries locally and abroad by broadening your people networks through various ministry opportunities, partnerships, and training.

Here are a couple of examples:

1. Tokyo-Taipei Missions Trip- This is primarily a vision trip for persons who would like to better under-

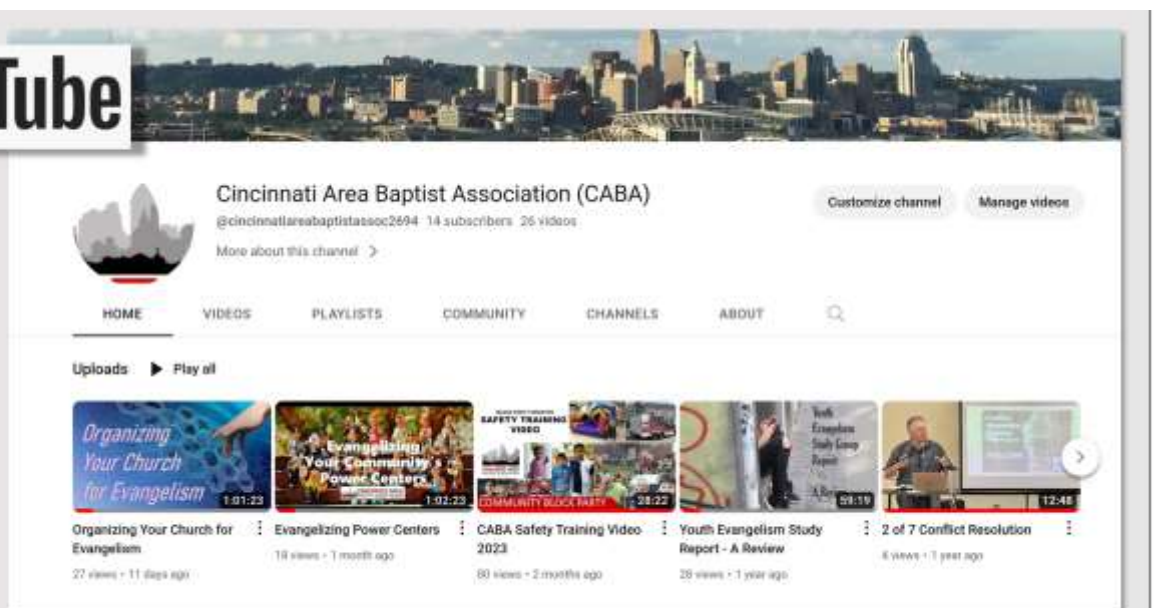

Generous Women

Barna Research suggests one approach is to appeal more directly to women.

"Women are more likely than men to believe God values our expressions of generosity. Nearly half (45%) indicate that their generosity is "extremely important" to God, compared with 36 percent of men.

Practicing Christian women are also more inclined to say their ultimate financial goal is to serve God with their money (32% vs. 20% of practicing Christian men)."

Every three months NAMB endorsed church planters complete a quarterly report. This report may be inconvenient at times to complete but it is important for several reasons. One result of this report is the encouragement that it offers to read the reports and see how the Lord is blessing.

Over the last quarter, which was from January through March, there were eighty-four salvations and forty-five baptisms in our church plants. Currently there are over 2,000 people attending the Cincinnati area church plants with thirty-one individuals participating in a church planting residency.

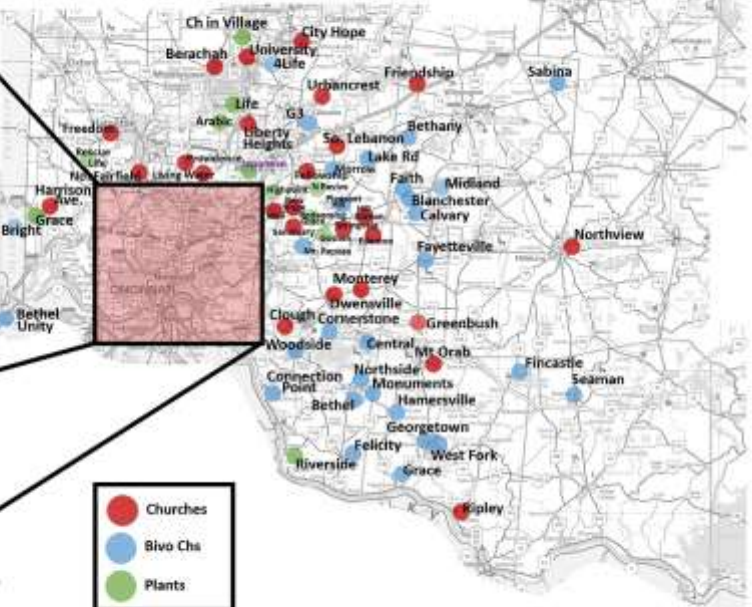
