Earlier this year, God called me back to pastor after a period of denomination ministry. It's been wonderful, and we are seeing progress already as we see God do His work to revitalize Beacon Church toward gospelcenteredness. I also know however, the difficult task ahead. After all, our world is dving and our culture is burning. But how can we even begin to respond?

I began by asking questions: what are the community's greatest needs? What does the church have that no one else can offer? What if we offered hope for the deep-seated issues around us? We knew that we didn't want to just give band-aid solutions like what the world had offered. We knew we needed to provide permanent solutions. Bible solutions. Solutions that affect the soul and spirit, solutions that can help a person be healthy and love the Lord God with all of their heart, evangelism. soul, mind, and strength.

Take one example: the topic of anxiety has gained great attention, and of adults aged 18-29 nearly 42% report suffering from anxiety.

The Death of **Evangelism:** Five Issues We **Must Address**

The issue may be the biggest surprise of my ministry. Jesus' ministry on earth began with evangelism and concluded with

Why, then, is evangelism dying or dead in most churches? Why do denominations seem to be talking about everything but evangelism? Here are five issues that we must address to answer these questions:

1. Denial is not a good evangelistic strategy. Many church leaders and church members, as well as

denominational leaders, do not talk about the anemic evangelism in their churches.

The last few months have been exciting. I missed the bottom step at my home and fell forward in a way that shattered my leg while on my way to meet with Mark Wilson and Brent Wilson, our consultants. They are doing a great job connecting churches that have a need or two with churches that can step in and help. I hated missing that meeting (and that step!), but they sure don't depend on me to help our churches.

Missing an overseas mission trip due to surgery was rough on me. I was hyper-vigilant in those first few days because the team went ahead and I stayed alert in case the team needed anything. I was delighted to help on two early-morning requests made via Whatsapp. It made me lean

And, by staying home, I was able to better plan a meeting for 20 pastors and their leaders. I was blessed to introduce People Teams to them in mid-August. People Teams Training is seven videos and a leader guide that I developed and recorded during my sabbatical in June this year. It trains church members how to cross cultures and engage one of Cincinnati's 47 immigrant groups, 30 of which are unengaged.



However, as I've seen how they didn't allow it to discourage them, I have been reminded of the Bible wisdom: "Though a righteous person falls seven times, he will get up, but the wicked will stumble into ruin" (Proverbs 24:15-16 CSB). May CABA churches and our terrific pastors and leaders continue to advance forward, even if taking a fall or two in stride.

Responding to this need in our church and community, I planned out a short series on everyday concerns such as anxiety, depression, anger, and fear, focusing on the solutions that God has provided in His Word. I also offered follow up opportunities, giving next steps for people who needed to get help for healing.

The response at Beacon has been nothing short of amazing. We've seen growth in our worship attendance and more opportunities for counseling behind the scenes. We gave away resources to those responding to help them take their next step to health. And there's a sense of anticipation in the members and attendees to see what God has to say about each issue we examined.

As I finish this series, it's encouraging to see the way that God has His church the tools to tackle the issues head on. I have seen firsthand how God can minister to those who suffer through His gospel. And by using the power of the Word that changes lives, the Spirit that helps us to build up others, and the resources of the church, our world can have hope. A permanent hope. 

- 2. Evangelism is spiritual warfare. Jesus was physically present with his first disciples when they traveled and shared the gospel. Jesus promised us the power and the presence of the Holy Spirit when He ascended to heaven. Simply stated, evangelism is at the forefront of spiritual warfare. We can't go it alone. We must have the Holy Spirit leading us and empowering us. Satan will do anything in his limited power to stop the spread of the gospel.
- 3. Prayer must accompany evangelism. Since evangelism is spiritual warfare, we cannot and must not attempt to share the gospel in our own power. The most effective evangelistic churches strategically wed prayer and evangelism.
- 4. Churches must learn to celebrate evangelism. Celebrate conversions, baptisms, and professions of faith. Celebrate faithfulness of church members who are sharing the gospel. Celebrate the changed lives of new believers.
- 5. If your church does not have enough time to prioritize evangelism, you have ceased to be obedient to the call of Christ. Evangelism, preaching, prayer, and small group leadership are critical. If you are too busy to lead in evangelism, you are too busy.

The most common trait of churches who address these five issues is that they have a pastor who personally prioritizes evangelism. While we would never suggest that churches look at a pastor as a hired hand for evangelism and growth, we can say unequivocally that an evangelistic church must have an evangelistic pastor.

Evangelism is dead or dying in most American churches. Perhaps God is awakening you and your church to reverse this reality in His power.



Getting Laced Up for that Football Testimony

In high school I played center on the varsity football team. When you hike the ball, you touch the ball on every play. Footballs typically have three sections with laces in the middle.

Think of one end as the first section of the football. Think about your own conversion story. What was your life like before conversion? Where did your journey of faith begin?

Move to the big section between the two stripes. The laces are like steps to faith in Jesus. People begin recognizing that God exists and others might count the cost for following Jesus. They may even say that the Holy Spirit convicted them of their sin. Some refer to Bible knowledge through stories and verses that were important to their salvation experience to move them as a lost person through the spiritual laces. Each lace helps you tell your story down to the realization that you need to pray and ask Jesus to forgive you of your sins and make Him king of your life. Southern Baptists believe that repentance and belief are inseparable experiences of grace.

The last section happens after conversion. It describes how you obeyed Jesus by following His example in baptism by immersion. Then you can describe other things you did because of being spiritually transformed, including sharing your faith with others.



By the time you give your football testimony, you should be able to look a person in the eye and ask in love, "You've heard my story, would you like to do the same?" Pray with them a prayer of repentance because of what Jesus did for each of us. Then follow-up.

Now, get in the game! God doesn't want any of us riding the bench.

It has been a great year for the Block Party Trailer Ministry. As I write, there have already been 147 total reservations made in 2023 and churches are still making reservations. 43 Evangelism Reports have been turned in and according-to those reports seeds have been planted in the lives of 17,167 people. There have been 2,346 Evangelistic Encounters with 35 professions of faith. Praise the Lord!

Improvements: This year we have added some helpful tools to our Block Party Trailers. Each trailer now has clear pictures and labels to direct the churches when returning the amenities after their event. This will aid the church that uses the trailer next because everything will be returned to its rightly place. We have also added a third generator to each trailer in case one of the generators does not work. Our goal is to also have an extra blower in each trailer for back-up support as well.

We were excited and eager to deplane our long and sleepless flight. We had finally arrived at our destination in South Asia! In the coming days we were able to walk around the neighborhoods outside of our hotel. It was impressive to see the diversity of people and cultures represented. Adjacent to the Marriott Courtyard hotel were luxurious looking high-rise apartments. As we walked around to the other side, there were rows of dilapidated homes. Then we maneuvered through the heavy traffic to cross the street.

The traffic flowed like a river. Open spaces were quickly filled in. The nimbler motorcycles darted in between the cars.

We visited a famous Arab restaurant that was quite busy and filled with Muslim clientele. The locals often did not use eating utensils, but used their right hand to place the food into their mouths. Finger bowls were brought in at the end of the meal to clean our hands.

We had the privilege to train 23 national pastors and leaders at a local church. The pastor that was hosting us began our sessions by singing his prayers to the Lord. We had to make special arrangements to have a whiteboard and markers available to do the training. We did not realize it at the time, but the pastor had rented some 30 chairs for all of us to sit in. The church does not use chairs and the attendees sit

on the floor during service and for lunch afterwards. After the training we had lunch together and they shared about their ministries and the persecution they faced as Christians.

I had the privilege of preaching in a house church. I was interrupted in the middle by the prayers emanating from a nearby mosque. We spent many hours with our new friends. They poured out their hearts and connected with us. This made me think about the 60,000 plus South Asians in Cincinnati. Before this trip, it had been so strange for me to visit a temple in West Chester. Now, I have a better understanding of the people of South Asia.

The Lord has connected my ministry to people groups in Cincinnati with that of the people groups of South Asia!



They also have recently started a ministry to help families in need with a resource center that supplies needed cleaning items as well as items needed for children including diapers. The response has been overwhelming as hundreds of families come to the center for help. Aarron is partnering with Matthew 25 Ministries and other churches to meet the needs. He stressed the importance of making the families feel welcomed and loved without a high pressure invite to church that might turn some off. 
Oliver Hawkins Church Planting Catalyst, NAMB
